



Co-Lab 2: Course Aims

• Introduce students to their role as emergent creative practitioners through research-based practice.

 Collaborate across disciplines to generate ideas and make work in response to historical, theoretical, and current cultural contexts, and a shared project brief.

• Reflect and critique their creative practice in response to a shared project brief.

Document, present and communicate their creative work to others.



Introduction

Engaging with the Anthropocene inspires us to make work that speaks to and about the planet we inhabit.

It enables us to reflect on the impact human behaviour has on the environment around us,

■and to think ethically and sustainably about what we do.

Co-Lab 2 asks you to explore the narratives that underpin your work, develop your research collaboratively and explore ways to present and communicate your ideas to others.

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First Year Experience

Promote participation and empowerment

- Working with others through dialogue and negotiation
- Produce ideas that would not have been reached alone



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- Chaos, friction, risk, can unsettle or discomfort participants.





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- Draw on lived experiences to inform their new learning environment.
- Exposure to risk and open forms of learning that encourage creativity.

I was fine, it was the rest of the group I would change.






It was frustrating because no one was cooperating, and no one's ideas were bouncing off each other.

Physically making together, learning from this, "making things and making things happen"



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
