GLEAN: EARLY 20TH CENTURY WOMEN FILMMAKERS AND PHOTOGRAPHERS IN SCOTLAND, City Art Centre, Edinburgh, 12th November – 12th March 2023

SUMMARY

This ground-breaking exhibition presented the work of fourteen pioneering women photographers and filmmakers working in Scotland during the early 20th century. The women were Violet Banks (1886-1985), Helen Biggar (1909-1953), Christina Broom (1862-1939), M.E.M. Donaldson (1876-1958), Dr Beatrice Garvie (1872-1959), Jenny Gilbertson (1902-1990), Isabel F Grant (1887–1983), Ruby Grierson (1904-1940), Marion Grierson (1907-1998), Isobel Wylie Hutchison (1889-1982), Johanna Kissling (1875-1961), Isabell Burton-MacKenzie (1872-1958), Margaret Fay Shaw (1903-2004) and Margaret Watkins (1884-1969).

The exhibition was curated by Jenny Brownrigg (GSA Exhibitions Director), in partnership with City Art Centre. The exhibition was on first floor, City Art Centre. There were **14** women represented, by **125** photographs, **8** films and **35** related artefacts, drawn from **17** archives.

There were **32,657** visitors to City Art Centre from 12th November – 12th March 2023.

There were **10** events (7 in-person, 3 digital), **3** workshops and **4** digital resources created. The total event attendees were **924**. The total views of related digital content **1705**.

There were a further **3** events, where an invite was extended to the curator to speak as a result of the exhibition.

SHOW OUTLINE

The exhibition aimed to show how the 14 women filmmakers and photographers responded with their cameras to life in Scotland's rural communities, cities and beyond. Their work was drawn from 17 archives predominantly across Scotland, ranging from Galloway to Shetland.

What were the women's different motivations and how did this inform on the photographs and films they made? What different narratives about Scotland emerge from their work? Whilst the majority of the women in this exhibition made their work independently, a small number worked in the film industry. Two set up commercial photography studios. When assessing the aims of these women, their films and photographs were used for a variety of purposes – to record events, to share with communities as well as wider audiences, to educate, for research use, for work, to sell, or to illustrate the other activities that they were involved in. Whilst some described themselves soley as photographer or filmmaker, many described themselves in multiple ways – author, historian, folklorist, photographer, filmmaker. Two of the women had gone to art school, with the rest self-taught or learning as part of a job. A small number would not have thought of themselves in such terms as photographers or filmmakers. Seen in the whole, the work of these women provides a different insight into documentary practice from this period.

These women presented different accounts of Scotland, covering both rural and city places and communities. The exhibition showed the breadth of their photography and filmmaking, offering a critical analysis of their work and how these informed the work they made, and the different narratives we see emerging from their work in Scotland. It is the first time their work will have been seen together, and it uncovers a previously untold story within the history of Scottish photography. Exhibits were drawn from a broad selection of private and public collections. The exhibition was curated by Jenny Brownrigg (The Glasgow School of Art Exhibitions Director) in partnership with City Art Centre.

The exhibition funding came from The Glasgow School of Art research development fund and City Art Centre.

The total visitors to the City Art Centre were **32,657** from 12th November – 12th March 2023. The footfall was therefore, on average, **272** visitors per day over the show run.
